

ON THE TABLE

Easter

his Tribune has two major features in the front half. This in itself is not unusual, as our readers know. But, as editor, I departed from our usual practice in a couple of ways.

First, there is the report from the MidWinter Fellowship Meeting in Orlando, FL, held February 16-18. The meeting was unique in several ways, and so I asked our national officers to provide the commentary for the meeting from their perspectives. Some facets were recognized by all the officers, while other facets stood out to them as individuals based on their respective levels of responsibility. Not only does this give our leaders an opportunity to speak to the Fellowship, but it also gives readers insight into our leadership's outlook on the Fellowship's present state and future prospects.

Second, the Easter feature in this issue is the longest article I have placed since becoming editor — taking up about eight pages total. The author is Pastor Greg Baxter of Faith Journey Church in Lawton, OK. For several years, Greg has been publishing on social media a series of meditations based on the events of Easter Week for his fellow pastors. We have enjoyed his compilations of the Gospel accounts, and I thought they should be shared more widely.

In keeping with our "15 for 2015" motif, I asked Greg to recast the material in a 15-step version. Except for the actual crucifixion portion (which takes a little more than a page), each step can be easily read as part of a devotional program leading up to Easter Sunday. We have kept all the Bible references Greg included (but we placed them in a margin), so the reader can see all the passages he used for the studies. The article represents a large amount of detailed work and study, and mastering even some of its contents will help make the events of the week leading up to the Lord's resurrection much more meaningful.

Christmas is more showy than Easter, and it is observed more universally even among nonbelievers, but for those of us with faith in Jesus Christ and His Gospel, Easter is surely the more important Christian observance.

Think about it. We are not sure about the date of Jesus' birth even now, but for Easter we have a real date to commemorate in space and time. When Jesus was born there was barely any human witness at all, while there were hundreds of eyewitnesses who bore record to the risen Lord. Outside the Gospels, there is little reference to the nativity, while references to the crucifixion and resurrection and their implications fill the pages of the rest of the New Testament.

I like Christmas, I admit, but if the holiday were banned (and it has been from time to time), I don't know that I would mind much. Skipping Christmas (which is the title of a John Grisham novel describing how a modern couple attempted to skirt Christmas observances) might not be such a bad thing, but I cannot imagine getting along without Easter.

A church planter's vision

What a thrill to see the overwhelming number of church planters at the Orlando meeting. The energy and fire they brought to the meeting was extremely exciting.

Anthony Milas is our regional leader for the New England area. He has done a fabulous job of planting churches in this region by training and mentoring several young men from his ministry. Here is part of his New England story:

If God has called you to plant a church, then He will give you the ability to do it. The time has never been better to start churches. Whatever corner of the country you live in, there are people who are waiting to come across a church like the one in your heart.

We buried the idea, the concept, and the history of the struggling Granite State Baptist Church. The funeral gave way to the birth of a new church, founded on the conservative doctrine found in the Scriptures.

From the beginning, they knew that the strength of their church wouldn't be in their seating power, but rather their sending power. So in 2001, with a few people in the pews and even less money in the bank, Granite started Crossroads Church in the small town of Pelham, NH.

In 2003, Granite launched Journey Baptist Church. Today, under the leadership Rob and Krista Willis, Journey is a thriving community looking to start a new location in the future.

In 2007, Granite partnered with their first two plants to birth the Dialogue Church in Manchester, NH, and New Heights Community Church in Haverhill, MA, both led by people from the Granite church staff.

The story continues. In 2011, Granite was faced with the issue of more people than seats, and after holding four services on a Sunday, they embraced the idea of becoming one church in multiple locations. We said, "We won't allow space or time slots to dictate our ability to reach people with the Gospel. We will meet in movie theaters, schools, hotels — anywhere that gives us the ability to reach people for Jesus." Since that shift, Granite has launched three additional locations and a church plant in the city of Danvers, MA, under the leadership of Mason and Amber Adair.

For church planters with a dream in your heart, surround your-self with others who believe God isn't finished starting churches. Today our attendance is 1,600 at Granite Church, 400 at Crossroads (our first plant), 600 at Journey Church, and 400 at Dialogue Church.


We have many other young men who are planting successful churches in our Fellowship and we want to share their testimonies in the future as we continue to make progress with our APEX program.


Level of education influences outlook on homosexual lifestyle

Top 10 things churches just won't give up

- **I. Worship and music style** Even though God loves all kinds of worship, this isn't so for many congregants, many of whom leave churches solely because of the style of worship during service.
- **2. Order of worship service** A large number of congregants believe the traditional sequence of their worship services must follow a specific order. Changes in the Sunday church lineup is frequently met with uneasiness and even contempt.
- **3. Times of worship service(s)** Diversion from the "set" schedule can cause disharmony within congregations, who often schedule their Sundays around worship service.
- **4. Role of the pastor** Even though the duties of pastors vary widely based upon specific congregations' needs, many come to believe that there is a set of standards by which all pastors must abide.
- **5. Committee structure** Regardless of whether or not they are needed, church boards or other leadership groups within congregations are considered by many as being an inseparable aspect of many churches.
- 6. Specific ministries and programs Oftentimes, needs and finances change over time, calling for new, revised, or dropped programs. Such alterations can result in highly contentious exchanges that are detrimental to a healthy church.
- **7. Location of church facility** Location, location where the worship center is placed should not be an end-all debate that is the determining factor of one's membership.
- **8. Use of specific rooms** Needs change, and so do available spaces within a church. Understanding and flexibility are as important inside the church as they are within the Christian home.
- **9. Business meetings** As times and church staff change, the structure of meetings often remains the same out of "deference" to longestablished traditions.
- **IO. Staff ministry descriptions** Even though concessions must never be given regarding the Scriptures, roles within the church often need to change as demographics and church needs evolve. Such changes should not be regarded as if one is altering the Bible.

LIGHTHOUSE BAPTIST CHURCH E. D. Hill, Pastor Arlington, Texas To The Tribune:

The Lord has really been blessing the Lighthouse Baptist church of Arlington the past several months. When we took this small church in April, 1954, there were only one other family and my wife and I, and a total of five in Sunday school. For many weeks and months we struggled along, with just a few in number and lots of services the five of us. The church did not give anything to missions and had not baptized any of the ones that had been saved or had come into the church from other denominations. I was the fourth pastor that the church had had the short time it had been organized. I felt led of the Lord to start tithing our offerings to missionaries of the Baptist Bible Fellowship. We voted on this, and it was unanimously agreed to give 10 per cent of our offerings, (small as they were) to the missionaries of the Fellowship. Our first monthly check amounted to only \$10. The past month has been our greatest, with \$70.40.

We completed our baptistry as soon as possible and baptized the ones that had presented themselves. After a few months of testing, the Lord started blessing on every hand. We gradually began to get a family or two every now and then.

When we started averaging in the 30's in Sunday school, we started a Sunday school building that will take care of approximately 200 people. We finished this building around Christmas and since then our attendance has tripled. On Feb. 27 we had a special all-day service. We had 130 in Sunday school and the auditorium was full for the preaching service. Since then we have averaged close to 100. We have seen Tribune staff, that it might continue to do as good a job as it has done in the past. This paper has meant more to me and to our church than any other thing I know of. One of the Southern Baptist pastors said the other day, "Your paper is always fighting us, and we never fight you.' But he was just angry because one of his members had left his church and come with us.

We are truly thankful and praise the Lord for this victory-that it is possible for me to be in full-time work and putting my full time visiting, working, and praying for the church.

Arlington lies between Ft. Worth and Dallas and is the center of a great industrial area. It offers a challenge to us to preach the Gospel to thousands of people that have moved and are moving here from all parts of the United States. Many of these say they have never heard the Gospel before. General Motors has a new huge automobile assembly plant in Arlington which has resulted in one of the largest transport companies to move here. God has worked among these men of this transport company in a miraculous way. God gave my wife and me the privilege of going into one of their homes and leading both husband and wife to the Lord. This family has been the key, it seems, to the gorwth of this church and they have brought many souls to church, where they have found the Lord.

I thank God for my training at Baptist Bible College. It is a wonderful place, I feel that the High Street church has been an equal blessing to me, under the leadership of Bro. Dowell and Earl Smith. I look back and see that it was just as much God's will for my wife and me to be in High Street church as it was to be in the college. To me they fit together perfectly.

ENTHUSIASTIC FELLOWSHIP AT AIKEN, S. C.

AIKEN, S. C.-An enthusiastic fellowship meeting was held in Temple Baptist church here, Rev. Hugh Hamilton, pastor. Ten cities in South Carolina were represented, along with Augusta, Georgia.

Chief speaker at the meeting was Noel Smith, editor of the Baptist Bible Tribune, Springfield, Mo. Mr. Smith spoke to the group on existing conditions in religion and politics and what should be done about them.

"I have a contempt," he said, "for this purely negative attitude so widespread among those who have no sympathy with the ecclesiasticism of the Southern Baptist Convention. We are obligated to expose and repudiate an arrogant ecclesiasticism which has repudiated the historic principles of Baptists; but we are equally obligated to create a responsible substitute for this ecclesiasticism. I will not tear down something until I am sure that I can build something in its place."

A Corporate Responsibility

Mr. Smith said that we have a "corporate as well as an individual" responsibility. "We do not have the right," he said "to do as we please. As servants of Jesus Christ we have the obligation to do all in our power to promote unity among those of like faith and order. It is no secret that I believe in creating a brotherhood. And there is a brotherhood, or should be—a brotherhood composed of those of like faith and order—a brotherhood. those of like fath and order—abrotherhood composed of those who believe in New Testament Christianity. There is a faith and there is an order. And say what you will, if you ignore the order you will not long have the faith. The fact that I am opposed to Modernism and an arrogant ecclesiasticism does not for a moment mean that I am a spiritual and in-

tellectual anarchist."

The preaching was phenomenal, and the breakouts relevant and helpful. And the fellowship was great, seeing so many new faces both young and old.

The highlight for me was the fervor of church planting throughout the week. We saw younger men on fire with a passion, enthusiasm, and energy that gives a shot of spiritual adrenalin which I believe will result in hundreds of new churches.

Sean Sears's message moved me Monday night. (If you missed the meeting, download the message). As he preached, my mind went back a few years when we planted RiverWest Baptist Church. I understood when he talked about the concern for support, and when he talked about eating and sleeping church planting. He wept as he confessed he was a sinful man with a sinful heart who has a great task before him. What a convicting sermon as the Holy Spirit made us search our hearts.

The ship is turning, and the momentum is evident as we move forward to the May meeting at BBC and then High Street in September.

he Orlando meeting showcased the need for a cause to drive us. By definition we need a cause to drive the engine that empowers our movement to achieve Godly impact in the world today. In recent years, the cause has been diminished by a variety of secondary issues. The Orlando meeting was focused on church planting as were the original energies of our founders. This past week we embraced many styles of ministry in the excitement of building young church planters into successful and God blessed pastors. The cause was back.

The need for our passion to be directed to church planting (the cause) was graphically displayed when President Lyons mapped our Fellowship across the 50 states in a media presentation during the directors' meeting, and we were forced to look at glaring holes in our structure. Orlando lifted the whole movement of rebuilding and increasing the outreach of our Fellowship onto the next level by welcoming men on the fringe to join in the mainstream.

It was noted that church planting isn't measured by loan values but eternal values. Our flagship school announced that the strenuous efforts of the past two years resulted in some very good news from ABHE (an accrediting association). However, the meeting allowed us to see the benefit of having a meeting focused on one area — church planting. We had committee meetings and breakouts, but the day belonged to the church planters and the momentum grew.

Looking ahead, would it be too much to assume that on our 65th birthday, the May meeting could be focused on the value of our educational entities? And could we begin even now to fuel the excitement of missions in Korea for March 2016.

think Dave Janney and his team did a remarkable job putting the program together. I personally think we accomplished much in Orlando. The atmosphere was great, the preaching challenged us, and I left encouraged. I want to thank Dave Janney and Orlando Baptist Church for hosting the winter meeting and making it such a pleasant experience.

The Christian faith is unique because of Easter. The founder of every major religion except Christianity is dead and buried.


Yes, Jesus Christ died a sacrificial death but he also rose from the dead after three days. True salvation was provided by God himself through the atoning death of his Son. And his resurrection proved, among other things, his deity (John 2:19-22), the guarantee of the believer's resurrection (Rom. 8:11; 1 Cor. 15:12-14, 20; Col. 1:18; 1 Pet. 1:3; Rev. 1:5), and the indwelling of the Holy Spirit and resurrection power (John 14:17; Acts 2:38; Rom 6:4; 8:11-14; Eph 1:13-14, 20; Phil 3:10-16).

The final steps leading up to the most profound and far-reaching event in human history unfolded over eight days. The sequence of events in the last week in the life of our Savior's life that lead to his death, burial, and resurrection are recorded in the four Gospels. In fact 28% of the Gospels deal with the last week of Jesus' life. Matthew's Gospel deals with the least at 9% and John the most at 48%. Mark's record uses 38% of his work to report the events of Holy week and Luke spends 21% of his gospel documenting the final days of the Son of Man's life on earth.

In dating the chronology of Holy Week I used the 33 C.E./A.D. crucifixion date as presented by several Bible scholars. Specifically I follow Harold W. Hoehner (Chronological Aspects of the Life of Christ) and Darrell L. Bock's (Studying the Historical Jesus: A Guide to Sources and Methods) timeline regarding a 33 C.E./A.D. crucifixion. Their conclusions are presented in a very helpful chart and article by Pete Smith, Senior Pastor of First Baptist Church of Kingman (Kingman, KS). Ron Minton also wrote an excellent thesis on the chronology of the life of Christ as well.

My desire is for each of us to step alongside our Savior and reflect devotionally on this pivotal week day by day, and journey with our savior as he walks towards the cross! If you have different templates from what I am presenting, then plug in the appropriate event that happened on that particular day. Let's keep the focus on the cross not on being cross with each other over differences in chronology.

Now join me as we spend the next 15 days reflecting on Christ's last week of activities focusing on one step, one event at a time, as a way to prepare us to celebrate the greatest event in human history; Jesus Christ is alive! He has risen from the dead!



BACKSTORY

The backstory of Jesus journey to the cross was the final showdown between our Lord and the religious leaders. All Palestine was waiting to see if the Lord would, once again, confound the religious leaders as they tried to counter Jesus claims of being Israel's Messiah. The people enjoyed watching the Lord completely frustrate and expose the religious leaders as being full of pride and out of touch. They had about enough of this kind of treatment and were plotting to arrest, convict, and execute Jesus during the feast. They feared that if they waited he would slip from their grip again. The leaders were terrified the entire nation would perish if they accepted Jesus as Messiah, and he established a kingdom that would threaten Rome. They reasoned that one man's death is better than all Israel perishing. The Sanhedrin's plot included killing Lazarus (1) because it proved Christ's claims. Then they would arrest Jesus, put him on trial, and finally execute him (2).

Father, help me put the Easter season in its proper perspective. Instead of making it about new clothes, Easter parades, and egg hunts, or dinner with family, may I make Easter a time of worship, praise, and thanksgiving for what Christ accomplished for us on the cross.

Lord, we are reminded that the world is broken and does not value the life and ministry of Jesus Christ. They rebel against God and suppress the truth of the Gospel. We pray the lost will discover the true meaning of this holy season.

SATURDAY: MARCH 28, 33 A.D.

Today marks the beginning of the passion of our Lord. On Saturday, March 28, 33, Jesus arrived at Bethany (1). He was anointed at Simon the Leper's house and a large crowd gathered knowing Jesus was there (2).

As an act of devotion, Mary poured very expensive perfume, worth a year's wages, over the head of Jesus while he was reclining at supper. She then wiped his feet dry with her hair. The disciples, led by Judas, were furious at her for wasting such a costly resource. Jesus immediately came to Mary's defense and praised her for her selfless act of devotion. He praised her for her spiritual insight and understanding of his ultimate mission — his death on the cross. As a result, Mary will always be remembered for this act of love.

he next day our Lord and His disciples entered Jerusalem. The The next day our Lorg and this disciples cheer and date of the triumphal entry was Nisan 10 when the Passover lamb was chosen. Jesus was presenting Himself as Israel's Paschal lamb.

As Jesus enters Jerusalem from Bethany through the Sheep gate, he begins to weep for the holy city. His lament over the nation's failure to respond in faith is deep and profound. Our Lord understands the consequences for rejecting Him as Savior and Lord. He sounds like Jeremiah weeping over the exile (1) or Isaiah proclaiming the fall of Jerusalem (2). He wept uncontrollably and violently as he looked out over Jerusalem and contemplated their rejection of him and ultimate destruction by Titus in 70 A.D. There is no hope for any of us outside of Christ (3).

Lord Jesus, we worship and praise you as King over all creation and over our lives. All honor and glory belong to you alone. May we weep over our community knowing that rejecting Christ is a sentence of eternal death.

SUNDAY (CONT.): MARCH 29, 33 A.D.

After directing two of His disciples to Bethage to retrieve an unbroken colt, He enters Jerusalem as the crowd shouts "Hosanna" to the son of David, Hosanna, blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord, Blessed is the coming Kingdom of our Father David! Hosanna in the highest!" The triumphal entry is recorded in all four Gospels indicating the significance of this event in the life of Christ. He was officially presenting himself as the Messiah and King. This was the appointed day that the Prince of Peace would bring peace to the nation (1). Jesus' claim to be king is verified by four events. First, He proves his claim by exercising his kingly authority by having the disciples bring him a donkey and her foal that has never been ridden. Matthew and John record our Lord fulfilling Zechariah's prophecy of Israel's King entering Jerusalem riding on a donkey (2). Second, the crowd proves his claim as King by waving palm branches shouting out parts of Psalm 118:26 — a direct reference to the people's identification of Jesus as their Messiah. Third, the creation proves Jesus' claim by being prepared to cry out that he indeed is King if the people did not (3). Finally, Christ's compassion for Jerusalem and all Israel proved his claim as King (4).

Lord, your Kingdom is not just for a particular political brand. Renew the church's vision to aggressively extend the rule and reign of the Kingdom of God throughout the world until you come again or we enter into your presence. Keep the church from focusing on programs and projects that will take away from sharing the Gospel with all people groups. Compel each of us to remain faithful to our main mission which is missions. In Jesus name, Amen.

Seeing a mature fig tree with healthy leaves and sturdy limbs He decided to pick some fruit. Finding no fruit on the tree He cursed it (1). In cursing the fig tree Jesus was pronouncing judgment on the generation of Jews who refused to produce "fruits of repentance"(2). Like the fig tree, they were outwardly religious but inwardly barren of any good works.

the people. Three years earlier he had cleansed the temple (1) for its corruption and now he finds God's house has become a place of merchandise once again. He immediately drove out the This house cleaning was in the area reserved for all nations, where the gentiles who wanted to worship the Lord (2) could come and declare their devotion to the God of Israel. He immediately sat down, staying at the temple on guard to prevent further abuses,

Arriving at the temple complex that same day, Jesus immediately drove out the money changers, sat down, and began to teach moneychangers and overturned the benches of those selling doves. and began to teach the people that the temple was not the place for commercial activities. Yes, Jesus has the authority not only to purge, but to provide security and safety in the Father's house. The religious leaders were furious but could not do anything because they feared those who were listening and agreeing with Jesus' teaching (3). After a long day, Jesus and the apostles returned to Bethany for the night (4).

TUESDAY: MARCH 31, 33 A.D.

oday is the longest and most challenging day for our Savior leading up to his crucifixion. The Gospel records no fewer than 30 separate exchanges by our Lord with His detractors and disciples. In a word, the theme of the day is judgment. There are five movements in which Jesus weaves this subject matter into the conversation with friend and foe alike.

Early in the morning Jesus and the disciples returned to Jerusalem. The disciples saw the withered fig tree (1) and remembered Jesus cursing it as a lesson that Israel was under divine judgment for their unbelief. Peter could not reconcile Israel's judgment with the unconditional covenant given to Abraham, so Jesus encouraged him to have faith in God that the promises given to the nation would come to pass (2). Our Lord taught the disciples that faith grows through the power of prayer (3).

Father in heaven, remind us that every person must face divine judgment. Thank you that our sins were judged at the cross of Jesus Christ. We are justified freely by God's grace through the redemption of Jesus Christ because we have trusted him as our Lord and Savior. Amen.

pon entering the temple, Jesus spent the day debating with the religious leaders (1). He taught the priests and the elders truths concerning the Kingdom program through three parables. Later he turned the tables on the Pharisees' and Herodians' attempt to trap him politically with regard to taxes (2). Then the Sadducees tried to undo him with regard to the resurrection, and our Lord turned the tables on them as well (3). The Pharisees take one final shot by asking Christ which law was the greatest (4). Jesus' answer of loving God and loving your neighbor silenced them (5). Our Lord overcame the priests' and elders' trap about authority, the Herodians' political snare, the Sadducees' theological objections, and the Pharisees' concerns about the law. Next, Jesus challenges the religious leaders by asking the Pharisees who the Messiah was (6). If they answered honestly and correctly they would have to recognize Him as the Messiah and King. Realizing their dilemma they remained silent.

After these discussions, Jesus pronounced judgment on their generation — specifically, condemned the Pharisees' misinterpretation of the law and the Scriptures, their hypocrisy, and their external observances that made people appear righteous but within they were full of wickedness and rebellion (7). Finally, Jesus teaches the disciples a lesson concerning wealth and money brought to the temple by the wealthy and a widow. Spiritual giving is based on worship not wealth (8).

Our Lord's announcement of coming judgment on the city and the nation caused the disciples tremendous angst, so he revealed God's future plans. This message was focused on the eschatological program for Jerusalem, Israel, and the people of Israel.

Lord Jesus, teach us to pray in faith believing that you will fulfill all your promises to your people in spite of opposition, conflict, and controversy.

Help us to emphasize the heart over habits, a holy life over law, and a commitment to grace living and giving.

Help us to always remember that our future is secure because we will rule with Christ in the Kingdom to come. Come quickly Lord Jesus. Amen.

THURSDAY: APRIL 2, 33 A.D.

The next day, the Gospel writers record 29 separate incidents and exchanges of our Lord on the way to Golgotha. This day seems like it never ends for our precious Savior as the mantle of sin begins to wrap itself around the one who will ultimately bear all our transgressions and drink the cup of death and perdition bearing it on the cross in less than a day's time.

On April 2, 33, Jesus and his disciples prepare for the Passover meal. They make preparations (3:00-5:00 p.m. slaying of lamb) (1) and Jesus then washes the disciples' feet as a reminder that we are to serve one another (sunset/during supper) (2). Jesus then explains that one of them will betray him (3) and Peter wants to know who that person will be (4) and Jesus obliges him (5) and then pronounces judgment on Judas (6). Judas then responds to Jesus and the others (7).

Jesus then shares the Passover meal in the upper room (8). Judas leaves (9) and our Lord shares the new commandment of love (10), predicts Peter's denial (11), and tells His disciples that the sword they will wield in the future church age is the Word of God not physical violence (12).

Jesus moves on to comfort the disciples by leaving them with a helper and encourager in the farewell/upper room discourse. He tells them, "Let not your hearts be troubled (1). A helper is coming (2) and He gives them the gift of peace (3).

On the way to the garden, he continues with the teaching on the true vine (4), they should remain in His love (5), the world will hate them (6), the Holy Spirit is their helper (7), they will face persecution (8), the Holy Spirit will help (9) and their sorrow is turned to joy (10). They are to pray in Jesus' name as well (11). He predicts their flight (12) and then He prays an intercessory prayer (13).

FRIDAY: APRIL 3, 33 A.D.

here are 71 separate descriptions of the events leading up to the death and burial of Jesus Christ. The Gospel writers used three movements to record the day our Savior died for the sins of the world; the trials, the crucifixion, and the burial of our Savior.

The day started after midnight on 3 April, 33, with the first of several trials. A preliminary hearing before Annas (1) then Peter's first denial (2). They then took Him before Caiaphas (3) and Peter denied our Lord the second time (4). Finally Jesus is taken before the entire Sanhedrin and is sentenced to death (5). Immediately Peter denies the Lord the final time, the rooster crows, and he goes out and weeps bitterly (6).

Jesus is then taken before Pilate (7) while, outside the city, Judas, full of remorse, kills himself (8). Jesus does not answer Pilate's questions (9) who sends Jesus to Herod when he learns Jesus is a Galilean (Galilee was part of Herod's jurisdiction). Herod sends Jesus back after mocking and beating Him (10). Pilate declares Jesus innocent (11) offering the people a choice between sparing the life of Jesus or Barabbas. The crowd cries out for Jesus to die and Barabbas to live (12). Pilate's wife is terribly afraid for her husband and his decision to condemn Jesus (13) and Barabbas is released (14).

The second movement is Jesus' crucifixion. He is condemned and sentenced to death (15). He is stripped, beaten, and mocked, then led away for execution (16). His cross has the title "Jesus the Nazarene, the King of the Jews" (17) and the soldiers mock Him mercilessly (18). The journey to the place of the skull, Golgotha, begins (19). Simon of Cyrene carries our Lord's cross when he stumbled (20). Many people followed the condemned (21) and they arrived at the place of execution (22).

Jesus is crucified at 9:00 a.m. (23), rejecting wine and myrrh (24) between two thieves (25). He utters the first of seven sayings "Father forgive them..." (26). His clothes are divided (27), and the guards posted the charges that Jesus died claiming He was the King of the Jews (28). The religious leaders are furious (29) as the crowd (30) and they (31) mock our Lord along with the soldiers (32). Jesus is offered wine and vinegar (33) while the criminals mock Him as well (34). One thief repents and the Lord promises that the thief will be in paradise with Him (35). Jesus designates His mother's provision (36) and darkness covers the land from 12:00 to 3:00 p.m. (37). In agony Christ cries out for the fourth and fifth time, "My God, my God..." 3:00 p.m. (38) and, "I am thirsty" (39). The crowd reacts (40) and He is again offered a narcotic for the pain (41). The crowd is looking to see if Elijah will save Him (42) while He receives the wine and vinegar (43). Jesus cries out (44) with, "Father, into your hands I commit my Spirit" (45) and finally, "It is finished" (46).

 $\mathbf{F}^{\mathrm{rank}}$ W. Boreham (1871-1959), a native of England and raised by devout Christian parents, attended school through age 14, worked for wages for several years, and then went to London hoping to secure a career position at 17 (he was accomplished at short-hand). He was converted while in that metropolis.

FRANK W. BOREHAM — Pastor and author

After a brief and unpleasant association with the Plymouth Brethren, he eventually became a Baptist, submitting to believer's immersion. Experiencing God's call into the ministry, he sought admission to Spurgeon's Pastors' College reportedly being the last student personally interviewed and admitted by Spurgeon before his own death in January 1892. Boreham spent two and a half years studying at the college.

During his days in London, Boreham heard and was influenced by Charles Spurgeon, D. L. Moody, F. B. Meyer, but especially A. T. Pierson. Burdened for missions, Boreham applied to J. Hudson Taylor and the China Inland Mission, but was not accepted due to a pronounced and painful limp he had because of a nearly fatal leg injury in his teens. Ultimately, Boreham went out to pastor a small congregation — in New Zealand, as remote from England as any inhabited spot on earth! Unmarried at his departure at age 24, he left behind Stella, a 17-year-old who would, as soon as she turned 18, sail

> unaccompanied to New Zealand to be married to the young pastor.

> Boreham spent about a decade in each of three pastorates, first in New Zealand, then on the island of Tasmania, and finally in Australia proper. During his first pastorate, he became a religious columnist in a local New Zealand newspaper, the beginning of a half-century writing career, during which his multiplied essays (more than 3,000) and some 46 books (often compiled from the essays, though several of them originated as sermons) were written. Among his books of sermons is A Bunch of Everlastings, or Texts

that Made History (1920) which is perhaps the most famous of his many published books. It is part of a series of 125 sermons on Biblical texts that transformed individual lives. In it Boreham discusses notable names from Christian history such as Martin Luther, John Bunyan, David Livingstone, Charles Spurgeon, William Carey, and Andrew Fuller, and particular

Biblical texts that had a dramatic and transforming effect on their lives, sometimes in conversion, sometimes in directing them toward their life's work as servants of Christ.

Boreham was a voluminous reader. He recognized that to write much and well, he had to study much, in order to have something worthwhile to say. He resolved to buy and read at least one book per week (biographies and autobiographies were areas of special interest to him), a practice he continued for decades, accumulating a great wealth of information in the process. He incorporated his accumulated stores of knowledge into his Sunday sermons and his weekly newspaper essays.

He retired from the pastorate at age 57 in 1928, devoting the rest of his life to writing and preaching.

The chatty, familiar, and engaging style in his essays and books, in conjunction with the diverse and interesting information they contained, made Boreham's writings a delight to read, and he became an internationally famous author during his lifetime. Once he was introduced by another preacher to an audience of preachers as "the man whose name is on all of our lips, whose books are on all our shelves, and whose illustrations are in all our sermons"!

Nearly all Boreham's books have quaint titles: Arrows of Desire, The Luggage of Life, A Casket of Cameos, and Mushrooms on the Moor are typical examples (a complete list of his books, with the dates of original publication, can be found on p. 257 of The Story of F. W. Boreham by T. Howard Crago). While Boreham's writings are generally far from rare in the used book trade, the original English and American editions fetch somewhat above average prices. Many of his writings have been reprinted in recent years, mostly in paperback, some with altered titles; some never-before-issued-in-bookform new compilations have also appeared. All these are easily acquired through internet booksellers. These literary gems will most assuredly repay the trouble to obtain and read them.

A brief account and appreciation of Boreham's life and labors was included by Warren Wiersbe in his book Walking with the Giants (Baker, 1976), pp. 152-160. The Wikipedia article on Boreham is an adequate short survey. There are two full-length biographies of Boreham: My Pilgrimage: An Autobiography (1940); and T. Howard Crago's, The Story of F. W. Boreham (Marshall, Morgan and Scott, 1961), written with Boreham's cooperation, and published not long after Boreham's death.



CURRENT Thriving in an Urbanized World

atever your address, you live in an urbanized world. Cities run the world. The powers, ideas, and influences of urban centers impact every person on the planet.

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We readily recognize the negatives of an urbanized world. The frenetic pace. So many voices. So many powerbrokers. A tsunami of information. Innumerable ideas and influences competing for the same space. These all contribute to the intensity of our day.

Yes, there is the rip and tear inflicted by an urbanized world. Many are not doing well in this environment. How about you?

Ironic. Humans have created this urbanized world which can be so hostile to humanity. Life complexity is exhausting. The problems can seem stifling. These elements take their toll on us physically. Never has it seemed that so many are suffering from non-accident related ailments and damage. There is a mental toll. Too much data, limited capacity to process. Emotionally we are taxed, strained, weary.

It goes without saying this urbanized world sucks the life out of our souls. There is no rest, no life-space. People living in rural areas are experiencing as much rat race as anybody else. What, with all the physical, material, sensual temptations, and external stimuli, spiritual life suffers big time.

William Wilberforce nailed it 200 years ago when he said, "The multiplication of great cities also, and above all, the habit, ever increasing with the increasing wealth of the country, of frequenting a splendid and a luxurious Metropolis, would powerfully tend to accelerate the discontinuance of the religious habits of a purer age, and to accomplish the substitution of a more relaxed morality. And it must even be confessed, that the commercial spirit, much as we are indebted to it, is not naturally favorable

to the maintenance of the religious principle in a vigorous and lively state."

And don't get me started about our impaired relational health. An urbanized world isn't friendly to relationships. Families are scattered, separated, rootless, tired, frayed. Many are technically tethered but practically estranged. With all the emphasis on the external, true intimacy becomes rarer.

Can we survive in an urbanized world? Can we thrive in this 21st-century environment?

Scripture centers on the city of Jerusalem. The New Testament drama is populated by characters thriving in 1st-century cities.

Jesus grew up in Nazareth, which, truth be told, was a hick town. But it was on a ridge with a view of Sepphoris a few miles away. This was a large, brand spanking new Roman city throbbing with life and activity foreign to the Godfearing Jew. Jesus undoubtedly was a frequent visitor.

Jesus said to seek first the Kingdom of God and His righteousness and these other things will be added to you. Spiritual things are first. Spiritual values and investments, spiritual relationships, and activities are a priority.

Paul was an erudite urbanite, comfortable in every situation, with any kind of people or culture. He speaks of supernatural strength. In an unstable world, in a taxing environment, we can do all things through Christ who gives us strength.

Think of Daniel, Nehemiah, Esther each thriving in challenging urban environments.

Daniel and his captive friends remind us that life commitments are absolutely necessary in a hostile culture. Daniel purposed in his heart that he would not defile himself.

What does Nehemiah's life say to people living in places like Detroit, New Orleans, Mogadishu, or our own disintegrating culture? Nehemiah didn't run from the destruction. He ran to it. Let's not hide behind church walls. Hear his call. "Rise up and build." Let's envision renewal. Let's get out in our world and build

something that honors God and serves people.

Esther reminds us to understand our moment. She received Mordecai's exhortation. Maybe you have "come to the kingdom for such a time as this." Understanding God placed us in this generation and armed us with everything we need to survive and thrive is key.

How to thrive? There must be a deliberate acknowledging of reality. You do live in an urbanized world! If you receive an inheritance but don't acknowledge it is actually yours, it will sit unused, unspent, uninvested. If you have a disease, you probably will not deal with it proactively until you acknowledge you have it.

Next, love the world God loves. The earth is the Lord's, all of it. The world and everybody who lives in it is His. For God so loved the world He gave His only Son. We are called to love the world God loves.

Think of living as serving, and living the life of a servant as thriving. We are called to serve. Fulfilling that purpose is to thrive, whatever the environment.

God provides us with practical anchors in our stormy world. The Lord's church is our spiritual family, our local spiritual army unit, our shelter, our feeding station, our encouragement depot.

The Lord's day anchors our schedule. The first day of every seven is devoted to worship, spiritual nurture, and service.

The Lord's tithe helps us remember to trust God day to day, lay up treasure in heaven, and live for eternity.

Scripture is jammed with people who thrived in hostile cultures. It's our turn now.

satisfactory. One missionary told him, "I wish I had taken this before starting deputation. This provided structure for preparation and the needed repetition for it to become a habit."


Another participant said, "Communication has been a passion of mine for 30 years. I've read many books and dedicated myself to better communication my entire ministry.

Piedmont International University and Tennessee Temple merge

In a press release March 3, 2015, the Trustee Boards of Tennessee Temple University (TTU) in Chattanooga, TN, and Piedmont International University (PIU) in Winston-Salem, NC, announced they had voted unanimously to approve a merger of these historic institutions. The merger will officially take place April 30, 2015, pending the approval of the Transnational Association of Colleges and Schools, which accredits both universities.

Established only a year apart in the mid 1940s, the two universities share similar histories and a common mission that stretches back to their founders, Charles Stevens (Piedmont) and Lee Roberson (Lee Roberson). They were friends, and Roberson said, "When we established Piedmont and Tennessee Temple within months of each other, [we] had a gentleman's

agreement that if either school ever faltered, the two should come together." The current merger, born from this common ancestry and mirrored purpose, is, in the words of Tennessee Temple's current president, Steve Echols, nothing short of "providential."

"Little did our founders know that their pledge of support to each other would find fruition nearly 70 years later," said Echols. "Merging with Piedmont is a once-in-a-generation opportunity. Piedmont International University is a well-respected, outstanding Christian institution of higher education whose impact through the years for the cause of Christ is immeasurable. We are proud to return to our roots and unite as one."

Following the merger, TTU online students

can expect decreases in their tuition rates and a seamless transition. Online programs will be transferred in their entirety to PIU. Also, residential students who move to Winston-Salem will experience a drop in tuition and room and board of around 25 percent. Several TTU Board members will join PIU's Board, and a portion of TTU's faculty and staff will be making the move to Piedmont.

PIU's president, Charles Petitt, believes the merged school will have far greater potential together than either school could have realized alone. While TTU is moving and PIU will retain its name, neither school disappears. Tennessee Temple's legacy will be preserved through the continuation of Temple Baptist Seminary as a school of Piedmont International University.

"After the first rehearsal, all four students were excited to perform with such a talented and prestigious group. Mr. Kruse mentioned to me personally about the high caliber of our students and their positive attitudes," said Carol Akers, Baptist Bible College music faulty.

Over two thousand people attend the conference each year, including vocal and instrumental teachers, music ministers, school administration, and parents and students from Missouri high schools, colleges, and universities that are performing at the conference.



"This conference gives all of our musicians the experience of observing other conductors, learning from workshops, and networking with other music teachers whether church or education. It also gives our students a way to expand their horizons," said Akers. "It's a great opportunity to expose the many high school students that attend the convention to the quality music degrees and programs offered at BBC."




Fellowship Faithfulness awarded to Al Janney

During the Monday evening service of the Midwinter Baptist Bible Fellowship meeting held in Orlando in February, the Fellowship recognized the long Christian service and leadership of one of its founders, Al Janney.

Born January 26, 1928, in Florida, Al Janney received Christ as his Savior at the age of 14 while attending Beaver Street Baptist Church in Jacksonville, FL. He served honorably in the U.S. Army during World War II, and after his return to the States, he married Elinor Brantley in 1947.

He was a student at Bible Baptist Seminary in Fort Worth, TX, in May 1950, when the Baptist Bible Fellowship was formed, and



he was among the founders of the new fellowship. He transferred to Baptist Bible College where he was the president of each of his classes and the first president of the BBC Alumni Association.

He assisted Pastor John Rawlings at Lockland Baptist Church in Cincinnati, OH, which was later renamed Landmark Baptist Church, and in 1954 he moved his family to Miami, FL, where he founded New Testament Baptist Church.

Ten years later, the membership numbered more than 2,000, and Dade Christian School had been founded.

As a longtime advocate of Christian education, Pastor Janney led in the founding of both the Florida Association of Christian Schools and the American Association of Christian Schools. In recognition of his leadership and accomplishments, in 1969 Bob Jones University awarded Janney an honorary Doctor of Divinity degree.

As pastor of New Testament Baptist Church, and later Jacksonville Baptist Temple, now known as First Coast Baptist Church, he served three terms as president of the Baptist



Bible Fellowship.

Mr. Janney now resides in Orlando, FL, assisting in the ministries of Orlando Baptist Church pastored by his son, David Janney, and traveling, speaking, and writing for the cause of Christ and missions.

Because of his close association with the Baptist Bible Fellowship International from its formation to the present, and recognizing his leadership in the areas of missions and Christian education, and as he continues to model faithfulness to his calling and his unflagging commitment to the ministry of the Gospel, he is a rightful recipient of the Baptist Bible Fellowship Faithfulness Award.



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

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SATURDAY: APRIL 4, 33 A.D.

The day after our Savior was brutally tied, beaten, and executed was the Sabbath. His followers, mostly women, feeling traumatized and numb, try to rest and make sense of what they experienced (1). Their grief was deep and profound.

All is quiet; the kind of quiet that follows a raging storm, a horrible hurtful family fight, or the end of a bloody battle between two powerful armies. The shroud of death hung over the city, the nation, and the earth like a thick dark cloud. Jesus' body lay in repose still bearing the open wounds, bruises, and dried blood from the beatings and trauma of being nailed to a cross for hours and dying an excruciating death. His tomb was sealed and guarded.

The Sanhedrin meet and request guards from Pilate for the tomb (2) but Pilate refuses and the leaders use their own guards for security (3). The leaders were desperately afraid the disciples would come steal the body of the Lord. They believed Jesus deceived the people about his Messiahship and about rising from the dead. The truth was, they deceived themselves and were trying to deceive others. The tomb is sealed and the guard posted (4).

Lord today it would seem the enamy has you leave is

Lord, today it would seem the enemy has won. Jesus is dead and there is no hope.

Teach us to wait in faith when it seems we are beat down and defeated, when our faith is weak, when people desert us and forsake us, when no one cares for our souls, or when we cannot make sense of our calling, Wait ...

Sunday is coming! In Jesus name we pray. Amen.

SUNDAY: APRIL 4, 33 A.D.

On April 4, 33, our Lord rose from the dead. He is risen! The women at the tomb are met by an angel (1). Jesus appears to the women (2) and the guards report to the Sanhedrin what took place (3). Jesus appears to Simon Peter (4), two followers on the Emmaus Road (5) and finally His disciples, less Thomas (6).

On the first Lord's day there was an earthquake, followed by the appearing of an angel, the opening of the tomb, and the resurrection (7). The group of women came together and started for the tomb just before dawn while it was still dark. Mary Magdalene, being a young woman, ran ahead and arrived first at the tomb, finding it open. Immediately she ran back by the nearest way to inform Peter and John of this fact (8).

The other women completed their two-mile walk from Bethany to the grave site arriving just after sunrise (9). An angel suddenly appeared to them and gave them an urgent message for the disciples (10). Another party of women come a little later and saw "two young men" dressed in white at the tomb, and receive words of comfort and instruction (11). About 6:30 a.m. Peter and John arrive, John getting there first (12). Mary Magdalene coming a little later saw two angels (13). The other women had returned to bear the message to the other apostles (14).

About 7:00 a.m. Jesus first revealed Himself to Mary of Magdala (15). A little later, He appeared to the company of women returning to the sepulcher, and sent them with the charge to the brethren to go to Galilee (16). About 4:00 p.m. he appeared to Simon Peter (17), and from 4:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. to Cleophas and his companion on the way to Emmaus. Finally, in the evening, probably around 8:00 p.m., he appeared to the eleven and others in the room with barred doors (18).
